Introduction

This resource binder is a document of various resources in the Lansdowne area. It contains many different types of information including how to register for grants, identification books, resources for building a crèche and a "how to" guide for building park and garden elements. It was produced for the informal settlement of Flamingo Crescent to help them during their upgrading process when the students from WPI have left. It may, however, be applicable to other informal settlements going through an upgrading project. The crèche resources are specific to the area but the information for grants, IDs, parks and gardens can be applied to the majority of informal settlements in the Cape Town area.

Identification Books

This section is to show you how to apply for an identification book for the first time or how to re-apply if yours has been lost or stolen.

First Time Applicants

First time applicants must submit the following documentation to their nearest Department of Home Affairs office or South African mission or consulate abroad:

- o Form BI-9, completed in black ink
- A certified copy of your Birth certificate or reference book or a copy of the old Transkei,
 Bophutatswana, Venda or Ciskei homelands identity or travel documents
- Two identical, colour photographs

Your fingerprints will be taken by a Home Affairs official and imprinted on Form DHA-9.

If you are a naturalised citizen or a permanent residence permit holder you must attach the following to your application form:

- Your naturalisation certificate and a copy, which will be certified by Home Affairs
- Your permanent residency certificate and a copy, which will be certified by Home Affairs
- Your exemption certificate and a copy, which will be certified by Home Affairs
- o Form BI-1620, which must be completed at a Home Affairs office

If the permanent residence permit or exemption certificate cannot be furnished, Form BI-829 must be completed for the issuing of a duplicate thereof. If the naturalization certificate cannot be furnished, you must apply for a duplicate prior to submitting the ID book application.

Please visit your nearest Home Affairs office to obtain original application forms & necessary information.

Re-issuing an ID book

You can apply to have your ID book re-issued:

- If you are married and want to assume the surname of your spouse. You must submit a copy of your marriage certificate, a completed application Form BI-9 and a pay the required fee.
- o If you are a woman and want to apply for a new ID in the name of any of your previous surnames, then documentary proof showing you are entitled to use that surname must be provided (i.e. a birth certificate, a marriage certificate, etc.) along with a completed Form BI-9. You will also be required to pay a fee for the re-issue.
- o If your ID book has been lost, stolen or damaged

You can apply for a replacement by:

Completing Form BI-9 as well if you have not previously submitted your fingerprints

- Attaching additional documents as required (e.g. a marriage certificate if you are married)
- o Paying the required fee for the re-issue

In the event you lose, damage or have your ID book stolen, you may request a Temporary Identification Certificate (TIC). This can be done at any office of the Department of Home Affairs and is subject to the verification of your fingerprints.

Flamingo Crescent Reblocking Plans Flamingo Crescent Currently

Last Updated: 12/12/2013

Description

This is the current map of the settlement. It shows the existing structures at the moment. This will be helpful at the moment of construction and deciding the order of it.

Color codes on Map:

Green – Represents new structures built. Metal reblocked structures.

Red – Represents structures that have been removed

Considerations to Take into the Future:

- F12 and F20 will need to be moved in the future. They are not located in their final position. Therefore, it is something that needs consideration when doing the construction steps.
- F 43A and F41 are where built with previous reblocking layout. Therefore, when reblocking is done their location needs to be revisited to ensure they are on the location indicated by the final layout.

Description


This layout shows the latest version of the final layout. Through this map it can be seen the way in which Flamingo Crescent should look after the reblocking process is completed. Besides the organized structures, through this map there are two main free spaces.

Spaces Available

The one in the middle will be dedicated to the possible crèche and multipurpose centre. The second area will be used to build a playground for all the children in the community, as well as it will serve for the outside space of the crèche.

Recommendations

On the top of the map where a group of trees can be seen, there is a free space. This could be dedicated to the different initiatives. One of our recommendations is that it could serve as a gardening space. Also it is highly not recommended to create a space for children to play, since it is very close to the road.



Savings Map

CECD

Background:

CECD is a non-profit organization providing training, resources, and support to institutions focused on early childhood development. While they are based in Cape Town, South Africa, their services and programs are offered across the country. The CECD has the largest budget of any equivalent centre in South Africa, but it does not have a budget of its own. It sustains itself through consultancy work, publications and research, and supports its programs through reallocated sponsored donations, grants, foundations, trusts, government departments, and corporate investments. A few students from WPI recently contacted them and they have committed to help Flamingo develop a crèche.

Social Context According to Eric Atmore

Life Expectancy:

• In South Africa the average life expectance is 56. Considering the proportional pyramid of ages, the smallest percentile is of the elderly. Thus, South Africa's economic concern is in providing funds for Early Childhood Development.



Standards of Crèches:

- The same pyramid can be applied to the crèches across South Africa.
 - About 5% of crèches are of the top caliber of organizations, with world class facilities more than capable of accommodating the student base, playground, kitchen, and WaSH facilities, access to top technologies, highly trained teachers, and all the funding necessary to continue functioning.
 - The next 20% are good with well trained teachers, reasonable facilities and educational materials. They don't have solid funding, and their facilities may not be in the best condition, but they are functional.
 - The next 30-40% of crèches are OK. They meet the minimum standards required by law for crèche facilities and have a teacher with minimal training.
 - The majority of crèches lie in the bottom 40-50%. These crèches are often in informal settlements or rural environments with little access to educational resources, the poorest of facilities, and lack a qualified teacher and curriculum. At best these crèches are "glorified babysitting."
- At present, there are about 24,000 of these poor facilities in the bottom 50% that support 1.5 million children.

Causes for poor support:

- Government support is biased in urban environments because it is easier to provide resources to dense populations.
- The Gini index is the statistical distribution of wealth where 0 is perfect equality and 100 is perfect inequality. The South African coefficient is 63.1- significantly skewed towards inequality.

ELRU

Background

ELRU is a non-profit development and research organisation whose mission is to be a respected advocate and capacity building partner in ensuring the right to development for all young children especially the vulnerable. It is a national organisation working across all provinces in under-resourced urban and rural areas to increase access to and improve quality in Early Childhood Development (ECD) services and programming. ELRU is a helpful resource for crèches. Their outlook focuses on learning through play and understanding how children develop and learn. They also value language so the books they sell are multilingual and they make their books easy to understand so that teachers can learn alongside children as they teach. Training Programs

- Level 4 ECD Basic Skills Training
 - This is a free course for adults with no previous experience or knowledge in teaching. It teaches the basics on Early Childhood Development and aims to prepare the enrolled for working in crèches.
 - The training course lasts 4 months and the enrolled go in to the ELRU center just down the road from Flamingo Crescent 3 days a week. Breakfast and lunch is provided.

Sometimes communities choose to send two groups of teachers in on alternating days so that everyone can take the course and the crèche can be run at the same time (one group would stay back and care for the kids while the other group went to training, then the next day, the groups would switch and so on).

Level 5 College Course

- This is an 18 month course offered at ELRU through False Bay College to receive certification. To enroll in this course, a person is required to have completed up to Grade 12 and must work or be a volunteer at a crèche. This course is offered at all campuses (Muzenberg, College of Cape Town, etc.). A stipend of about 1500 Rand per month for travelling expenses is available.
- To enroll, fill out the provided form, and then ELRU will organize an orientation for you to attend before classes start.

Process:

 To get enrolled in either of the training programs, fill out the provided form (more can be found at the ELRU building) and hand in the completed form to ELRU (must provide an ID number and cell phone number).

Materials

ELRU sells materials for crèches, both for teachers and for children

- Books all books ELRU sells are multilingual so students can learn in different languages.
 - Idea books for teachers
 - Have ideas for stimulating learning in children through activities like gardening, crafting and other learning excursions like stimulation through beach trips or trips to mountainous areas
 - ELRU's books are made and written to be easily understood so that teachers can learn from them as well with the children.

School Books

- ELRU sells a Math, a Science and a Language series for ages 5 to 9 years old (grade pre-school through grade three)
- Children's books
- Posters ELRU also sells inspiring posters that visualize important lessons for children

 Celebrate our Differences Poster has pictures of children of all ages, race and gender symbolizing uniqueness but also equality and oneness

Other

- The women we met with also explained that if Flamingo did start up a crèche, ELRU would most likely be willing to donate some of the above materials like books to Flamingo's Crèche
- ELRU also puts on book drives where local communities can donate to crèches

EL Child

Background:

Excellent Life Child (E L Child) is a Non-Profit Organization based in Cape Town. They are based at a local Primary School called Belthorne. E L Child promotes a Holistic lifestyle in the community, and works with children to develop their sense of purpose and importance in life. They also partner with the Virtues Character Building Project, Umfesane (Poverty Alleviation Programme), Novalis Ubuntu, Edith Stephens Nature Reserve, Lansdowne Library, Lansdowne Policing Forum, Belthorn Primary School and orphanages in the area.

E L Child started pavement school on Thursdays for the children of Flamingo, but people were having trouble bringing the children to the Civic Centre. The project they are currently working on in Flamingo is called OPERATION LOVE.





 - Tools
 - Drill
 - Wrench
 - Materials
 - 5 Tires
 - 4 Similar Sized
 - 1 Slightly Bigger
 - 8 Standard Bolts
 - 8 Hex Head Nuts
 - 16 Large Washers
 - Notes
 - Tires connected using tyre-to-tyre 90-degree bolt connection.
 - Drain holes in sidewalls (inside of cube) in each tire.
 - Single cube item is loose and free to move around.
 - Any size tires can be used but the larger the tire the heavier the cube.





• Tire Roller

Tire Seat – Makes 2

- Materials
 - 1 Tire
 - 8 Wood Planks
 - 4 for the seat
 - 4 for stability
 - o Length is the Width of the tire
 - 16 Screws
- Notes
 - Cut tire in half
 - Screw in support beams on either side
 - Screw seat on the top
 - Sand the wood



- 2 Bucket Surfaces
- 14 Wood Planks
 - 8 for legs all the same size
 - 6 for brace beams all the same size
- 12 Bolts
- 12 Nuts
- 24 Washers
- 4 Screws

- Cut all the wood to the desired length first and mark holes to drill
- Drill all holes
- Assemble first then tighten all the bolts

 - Scissors or Knife
- o Materials
 - Burlap or other Fabric
 - Soil
 - Plant Seeds
- o Steps
 - Pry off alternating boards if needed.
 - Staple burlap to inside of pallet, covering all gaps.
 - Cut holes in the front and top burlap and plant seeds in the holes.

 - Staple Gun
 - Materials
 - Tire
 - Mesh or Fabric
 - Steps
 - Attach mesh or fabric to bottom inside of tire using staple gun.
