



Map of Parks Surveyed






Age of Survey Respondents




Gender of Survey Respondents






"Dogs off leads are the absolute, leading factor. I would much prefer those with dogs to have an area fenced off for them to go."

"Less enjoyable in the colder weather."


"More gazebos and cover from rain"




Access to Toilets








MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING
